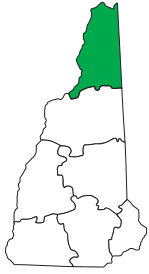


Great North Woods Region

Great North Woods—Woods, Water & Wilderness



The Great North Woods can be summed up in two words: unspoiled wilderness. Truly the last frontier, it is the northern most region of New Hampshire, stretching above the White Mountains, to the Canadian border. Its proximity to Canada's Province of Quebec, as well as the Maine and Vermont borders, has resulted in a fascinating mix of cultures and outlooks.

Vast woods and water dominate the landscape in the Great North Woods. Forest makes up 97% of the land, much of which is privately held but often open for recreational use. The famous Connecticut Lakes and the upper area of the Connecticut River offer trout and salmon fishing. Sporting adventure is a way of life, from hunting to fishing, camping, hiking, boating, rock-climbing and snowmobiling (with more miles of trails than state

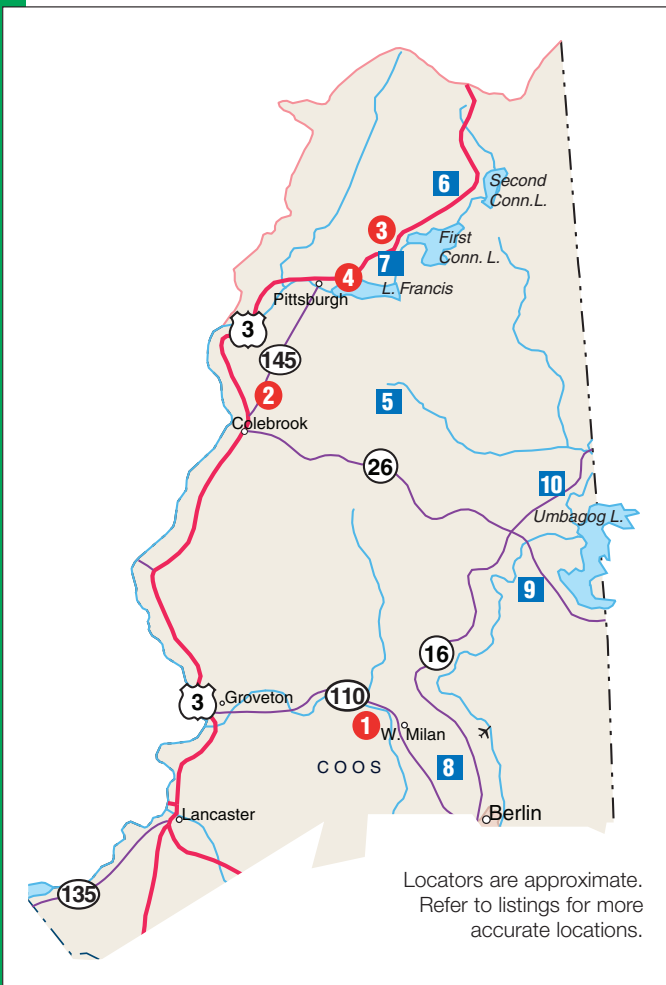

highways). Above all, the Great North Woods lends itself to wildlife watching, and is home to more than 3,500 moose.

Scenic drives are the highlight of the Great North Woods. Whether it be traveling on Route 3, which allows you spectacular views of the rolling farmland along the Connecticut River, or driving across Route 26 past one of the Grand Old Hotels "The Balsams" in Dixville Notch. Yes, it is a steep, but very short climb, nothing to be concerned about with that RV. Then you're on your way down towards Errol and Lake Umbagog, where the majestic American Eagle has begun to nest once again. Stop along your drive to take photos, pick wild blueberries or bring a picnic lunch to Beaver Brook Falls in Colebrook.

Heading south on Route 16 brings you to Thirteen Mile Woods, a beautiful drive thru undeveloped and uninhabited woods along the Androscoggin River, a favorite spot for fishing, canoeing and kayaking. As you enter the outskirts of the City of Berlin you can imagine the lumberjacks of days long past, as they jumped across the logs damming up the river, trying to keep the logs moving towards the old paper mill. For your own adventure, hike or bike the cross-country trails, the same trails that are explored on skis and snowmobiles in winter.

The Great North Woods Region is the epitome of the simple life with white steeple churches, farmers markets and hometown parades. Consistent with the region itself, the camping offers outstanding scenery and recreation, with a number of state parks as well as private campgrounds to choose from.

PROPANE SAFETY AT CAMPGROUNDS

Information provided by the NATIONAL LP-GAS ASSOCIATION

- If an RV has been idle and unused for some time, make some safety checks before using the LP-gas appliances.
- Check the entire vehicle, especially the propane system, for possible tampering. Make sure the propane tanks are properly secured. If the cylinders are not mounted on the vehicle, it is recommended that they be placed on level ground, on a firm foundation.
- Check all vents (including the regulator vent) and combustion air intakes to make sure they are clear, and contain no restrictions such as foreign matter, bird nests, mouse nests, or mud-dauber wasp structures.
- Clean away any debris from around burners and pilot lights such as burnt match sticks, bits of food, etc.
- Before turning on the gas at the tanks, be sure all appliance valves are turned **OFF**, and check to determine which pilot lights must be lit. After the gas has been turned on, be sure all pilots are lit.
- As a precaution to determine if any leaks have developed, give your RV a "sniff" test, do a soap bubble test at all connections, or contact your local LP-gas supplier to perform a pressure test on your system.



CAMPING ETIQUETTE FOR PETS



1. *Do Not* Allow pets to roam freely around the campground.
2. *Do Not* Allow pets to go out early in the a.m. to do their duty on your neighbor's site or worse yet on their equipment.
3. *Do Not* leave pets unattended on your site, which causes them to bark and whine disturbing fellow campers.
4. *Do* pick up after your pet.
5. *Do Not* Bring pets to beach and pool area.

DON'T MOVE FIREWOOD



This camping and hunting season, get your firewood from a vendor close to your destination. Don't pack your own! Invasive insects and diseases in dead and

dying wood threaten our native trees and forests. If you move firewood, you could be giving these pests a free ride to new territory.

Every camper, cabin owner, and recreationist should leave their firewood at home and obtain it near their destination... that could make a long-term difference in the health of our forests and the quality of our recreational experiences.

BRAKE FOR MOOSE IT COULD SAVE YOUR LIFE!



Today, in spite of a limited annual hunt, moose are found throughout the state, and so are moose-car collisions. We want you to enjoy traveling in New Hampshire. Here are some things you need to know to reduce the likelihood of serious injury and extensive damage to your vehicle.

The average moose weighs 1,000 lbs! That's 4 times the size of a big trophy white-tailed deer.

The hood of your vehicle fits neatly under the belly of the moose

Moose are a safety concern primarily from May to October.

Don't assume the moose has seen you and will wait until you pass to cross the road.
